# Orchids of Madagascar May Speaker: Ron McHatton, PhD.

Ron McHatton, a PhD Chemist by training, is currently the Chief Operating Officer of the American Orchid Society and is also the Director of Education. Having grown orchids for over 46 years, he has been exposed to just about every facet of the hobby.

Prior to working for the AOS, Ron was production manager for one of the largest wholesale orchid nurseries in the United States. His passion for orchids has spanned virtually every growing regime from windowsills to under lights to greenhouses, running from a 200 square foot hobby house to several acres of commercial growing space. Over the years, Ron's private collections has numbered in excess of 2500 plants.

In addition to his professional position, Ron is an accredited American Orchid Society Judge and has been volunteering for the AOS for over 25 years. During that time, he has chaired several national committees, has twice held a seat on the organization's Board of Trustees and briefly served as vice-president. In addition to Ron's volunteer support of the AOS, he has also been a long-time supporter of the Orchid Digest. In this role, he has served on its Board of Directors and Executive Committee for many years and as its President for three consecutive terms.

Ron's talk will be on the orchids of Madagascar, and will be one you will not want to miss.

#### Tasks for May:

- Space plants properly for good air circulation.
- Trim excessive foliage on trees and shrubs.
- Repot Phalaenopsis out of sphagnum.
- Finish repotting of various genera.
- Reset vandaceous plants, remove keikies.
- Water heavily early in month, more guardedly later.
- Initiate preventative spray maintenance program.

Average high: 87.2

Average low: 72.0

Average mean: 79.6

Average rainfall: 5.52"

May is a month of transition in South Florida. Early in the month we can expect the driest weather of the year. Because of the clarity of the air and lack of cloud cover, temperatures rise rapidly in the late morning and can reach the upper eighties or nineties by mid afternoon before cooling substantially in the late afternoon. Fortunately, over night, radiant cooling rapidly dissipates the previous days' heat. May mornings are a delight, the wise orchidest rises early to enjoy them and to finish his chores before the heat sets in. Chief of those should be extensive dragging of hoses.

With the increased heat and light of May we do not want to put our orchids on too lean of a diet. Fertilize with up to 2 tsp of 15-5-15 per gallon of water every week or so. Alternating this standard fertilizer with Epsom salts and potassium nitrate (at 1 tbls each per gal) is still a best practice during May. Always substitute fertilizer for a watering and apply like the water in two doses to the point of saturation. Potassium nitrate, 13-0-46. is the perfect companion to minor elements because it not only lacks phosphorus which would hinder the absorption of the trace elements but the nitrogen seems to enhance their uptake.

May is still prime time for re-potting. With cattleyas, dendrobiums and other sympodials, the virtuous among us have long since finished the labor of love, but the majority of us are faced with the moral dilemma of doing the potting or waiting until next year with the pseudo bulbs of our plant overhanging their pots and proclaiming to the world our sloth. The one instance, in which this dilemma must be resolved absolutely in favor of the plant, is when the medium has broken down in the pot. Decayed medium will encourage root rot to become stem rot which will pursue the rhizome even into those over arching bulbs. In in doubt, give the medium the "nose test". A pinch of medium taken from below the surface of the pot should smell "sweet". A sour smell or the odor of a pond bottom indicates medium that is broken down and must be replaced as soon as possible.

May is a great month for re-setting vandaceous orchids whose baskets have deteriorated or that have grown too tall to be easily managed. Keikies (off-shoots) can be most safely removed now. In both cases choose the most durable containers for the plants so they need not be disturbed for years. Teak or other hard wood baskets and clay pots last longest.

Leaving the taxonomic niceties to the experts, fungi which attack orchids in Florida fall into two broad classes; the leaf spotting types (*Cercospora* and *Phyllosticata*) and the soft rots (*Phthium* and *Phytophthora*). Fortunately, for modern orchidists, excellent systemic fungicides exist for both types.

All chemicals should only be applied at the rates and according to the label instructions. If in doubt about whether to or how to apply a pesticide, always call you local Agricultural Department.

#### Madagascar Orchid growers strike deal with perfume industry

A slender delicately-perfumed white orchid unique to Madagascar is the pick of the French cosmetics industry to symbolize its new commitment to biodiversity and sustainable development.

Angraecum eburneum longicalcar had all but disappeared from its natural habitat when much of its forest home was destroyed, but for this project will be grown commercially in partnership with Madagascar farmers, and then exported to France. "These orchids can be grown for use as either cut flowers or for their cosmetic value," said Alban Muller, president of both Alban Muller, a producer of fragrances and flavors, and the Cosmetic Valley grouping of France's top perfumers and



fragrance specialists. "Orchids have hydrating and softening properties. They also have a very powerful image, which is important for our industry," Muller said. Companies like Guerlain, Yves Rocher and Clarins have been using orchid extracts for a long time, he said.

The island of Madagascar was separated from the African and Indian landmasses 160 million years ago, becoming a sanctuary for rare plant species. It is now home to the world's greatest number of orchids species, with 1,200 different types. Starting in the 1930s, celebrated collector Marcel Lecoufle roamed the island in search of orchids, building up a collection that today includes 105 species native to Madagascar.

Françoise Lenoble-Predine, vice-president of the conservatory of specialized plant collections, says she has found three laboratories in Madagascar that are sufficiently well equipped to handle the delicate operation of reproducing the orchid. "This will enable us to begin reproducing other plants with high added value," she said, kicking off a process of sustainable development in a country ranked as one of the poorest in the world.

Madagascar is already a major producer of plants for the perfume industry, including ylang ylang, vetiver and vanilla, another member of the orchid family. "It is a country rich in natural resources, but very much under the control of middlemen who buy the crops while they are still growing," said Lenoble-Predine. Crops are bartered against rice, with merchants pushing up prices of the food staple, leaving farmers with debts of up to one and a half harvests and families short of food.

Angraecum eburneum could be cultivated in the very heart of the Madagascar capital, Antananarivo, where there are 3 200 hectares of polluted and deteriorating rice paddies.
